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

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NC State Research and Extension Works

We discover it, improve it and pass it on to help North Carolinians succeed. We don't stop at the lab. We put research into action at field labs and Extension offices across the state. Thus, helping to improve North Carolina's crop revenue which adds billions to the economy.



A few examples of our impact:

Food Innovation to Build N.C. Jobs

Eighty percent of all crops grown in N.C. are shipped out of state for value-added processing. The new N.C. Food Processing and Innovation Center (N.C. Food PIC) will open new markets for growers, enhance crop values, grow local food entrepreneurs and bring value-add processing jobs to rural North Carolina. Our food science researchers and Extension agents will play a critical role in helping grow N.C.'s food manufacturing economy from seed to supermarket in our own backyard.

Growing New Opportunities

To support our state's \$791M craft brewing industry, NC State researchers and Extension specialists are helping farmers identify optimal hop cultivators, ideal growing areas and addressing key issues related to nutrition, disease and pest control.

NC State Extension specialists are conducting

NC State Extension specialists are conducting industrial hemp research across the state to answer questions about how, when and what varieties to plant, and helping determine the actual market size and grower opportunity.

Consumers want low-calorie sweeteners from natural sources. NC State is developing stevia varieties ideal for N.C. soils and climates to help

farmers improve crop yields and taste to meet the growing demand of a thirsty beverage and food industry.

New World Leader in Plant Sciences

NC State – partnering with commodity groups, agribusinesses and startups – are developing a new, cross-disciplinary approach to plant sciences research in a world-class facility that will bring the brightest minds in academia, government and industry together to increase crop yields, enhance sustainability and extend N.C. growing seasons. Through Extension, farmers across the state will have direct access to the latest developments in agricultural technology from the new world leader in plant sciences.

Stopping Disease Cold Turkey

Blackhead disease can wipe out an entire turkey flock in weeks, causing millions of dollars in losses for N.C. farmers. The last remaining legal treatment for the disease was taken off the market in January 2016, but research at NC State has found a link between improved nutrition and gut health that can help combat this disease – keeping N.C. flocks and their \$885M annual economic impact healthy and strong.

as techniques for taking care of cuts and scrapes, nosebleeds, stings, burns, and other concerns. This camp was

created to teach first aid skills and help introduce youth to the medical industry and has exposed more than 250 youth to careers in the various medical fields over the past 13+ years.

many of our hay fields and pastures. Quick reminder, you can report any yield losses in your hay fields and pastures with USDA's Drought Impact Reporter.

Also, if you haved summer annuals like sudangrass, millet, or Johnsongrass during the dry weather, be careful of nitrates which can accumulate after a drought (or frost). NCDA&CS will test forage samples for nitrates for free. You can call the Nash County Cooperative Extension Office for more information.

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Wet Weather Fallout

After a long dry spell, most parts of the county have experienced rain and unseasonably cool temperatures during the second

half of July. Although every scenario is different, there are a few things gardeners and farmers can generally expect to encounter after periods of



heavy rain.
Here are a
few things
to keep an
eye out for.
First, be on
the lookout
for fungal
diseases. You
may notice
leaf spots
on plants

where water has sat on the leaves for long periods following rains, or root rots on plants grown in poorly drained soils. Leaf spot funguses are often treatable with fungicides or cultural methods, but root rots are much more problematic and difficult to resolve. Second, be ready for an increase in weed and grass growth. Water helps our plants grow, but that same rain fuels the weeds as well, so be prepared to spend a little more time on weed control and lawn maintenance over the next few weeks. Finally, watch out for fire ants. Fire ants are active almost vear round, but heavy rains in summer and fall often cause their mounds to swell and disperse. They'll become a lot more noticeable now. This actually makes them easier to find and be treated, but be careful not to step in any along the way.

Summer **Barbecues** and Food Safety

Here are a few tips to assure summer food safety - always Clean, Separate, Cook, and Chill.

Clean! Make sure you are properly washing your hands. Unwashed hands and food surfaces are a prime cause of food borne illness.



Separate! When packing the cooler for an outing; wrap raw meats securely and avoid raw meat iuices coming in contact with readyto-eat food. Wash

plates, utensils, cutting boards which held raw meat thoroughly before using again for cooked food.

Cook! Use a thermometer. Cooking food to the proper _ _ _ _ temperature kills harmful bacteria that causes food borne illnesses.

Chill! Holding food at an unsafe temperature is a prime cause of food borne illness. Keep cold foods cold!

Refrigerate leftovers promptly. Food left out of refrigeration for more than 2 hours may not be safe to eat. When the temperature is 90°F and above, food should not be left out over an hour. Remember to Clean, Separate, Cook, and Chill for a safe and happy summer!
